

Pastor's Corner



The manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles as represented by the Magi (Matthew 2:1–12).

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, ² asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay him homage." Matthew 2:1-2

The acknowledgment of worship to Jesus here, as practiced by the Wise Men and elsewhere in Matthew has Christological (*the study primarily concerned with the nature and person of Jesus*) significance, marking Jesus as the one in whom God is present. This story of the visit of the Wise Men also foreshadows the opposition that will be shown to Jesus by the powerful people of his day. In this story, the religious leaders of Israel do the bidding of a political ruler who wishes to destroy Jesus. Later the situation will be ironically reversed: the political ruler (Pilate) will do the bidding of religious leaders who have decided Jesus must die.

A literary masterpiece, this story in Matthew's gospel has captured the imagination of Christians for centuries and inspired the formation of numerous legends, songs and powerful images. The magi came to be identified as kings, probably due to an association of this passage with Isaiah 60:3- (Nations shall come to your light, and kings to the brightness of your dawn). They came to be called "wise men," an identification so enveloping that it is even used in English translations of the Bible (including NRSV). In the Middle Ages, the Western Church decided there were three magi (the Eastern church has twelve) and assigned them names: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. So, there it is.

Such legends are not insignificant for Christian faithfulness, but they may distract us from the story Matthew tells. Matthew's story is indeed about kings and wise men, but these figures are people other than the magi. Remember, the main king in this story comes as an infant, wrapped in swaddling clothes and laying in a manger.

The focus for epiphany is the appearance of God to people outside the religious community. The Gospel of Matthew reminds us that segregation and separation of the powerful and the lowly, the rich and the poor, the kings and the servants, began to erode with the coming of Christ, who was revealed to some who were thought to be on the outside. The church's observance of epiphany must encourage humble admission that God's glory may be manifested where we least expect it. Sometimes God's people become light for others (Isa. 60:3); sometimes they appear blind to the light others can see (Matt. 2:1-6). But always, the light is there, as God graciously, mysteriously, and defiantly breaks into human lives.

My prayer for us this epiphany is that we might see Christ's light and let our light shine for Christ in the world.

Cooking Up Relief in the New Year: Turmeric and Other Anti-Inflammatory Spices

Inflammation Explained

Inflammation is the body's natural response to illness, injury or infection, often causing redness, swelling, or heat. It possibly causes loss of function of the involved tissues. Acute inflammation is typically a protective and localized response to infection or injury. It's designed to heal the body and restore normal tissue function. If inflammation persists for a prolonged period of time, it becomes chronic inflammation. Chronic inflammation can be the result of an infection, autoimmune reaction, or allergy.

Certain foods have been identified as "anti-inflammatory" and may help to reduce chronic inflammation and pain. Omega-3 fatty acids found in fish, certain nuts, and even chocolate have all been acknowledged for their anti-inflammatory properties. Research into exactly how well these foods can reduce inflammation in the body is mixed, but promising.

Turmeric

Spice it up to reduce Inflammation. Turmeric is a brilliant yellow spice common in Indian cuisine that you can find in any grocery store. Turmeric has been used as a medicine for centuries to treat wounds, infections, colds, and liver disease. Studies have shown that curcumin, a compound in turmeric, may reduce inflammation in the body.

Ginger

Ginger is a zesty spice used in many Asian cuisines. You can buy it powdered or as a fresh root in most supermarkets. Ginger has been used as a traditional medicine to treat stomach upset, headaches, and infections. The anti-inflammatory properties of ginger have been praised for centuries, and scientific studies have confirmed its benefits.

Cinnamon

Cinnamon is a popular spice often used to flavor baked treats. But cinnamon is more than just a delicious additive in our cakes. Studies have proven that the spice has anti-inflammatory properties, which could help to ease swelling. Keep a good supply of cinnamon on hand and sprinkle it in your coffee or tea, and on top of your breakfast cereal.

Garlic

The anti-inflammatory properties of garlic have been proven to ease arthritis symptoms. And a little bit goes a long way in many dishes. Use fresh garlic in almost any savory dish for added flavor and health benefits. If the taste is just too much for you, roast a head of garlic for a sweeter, milder flavor.

Cavenne

Cayenne and other hot chili peppers have been praised for their health benefits since ancient times. All chili peppers contain natural compounds called capsaicinoids. This is what gives the spicy fruits their anti-inflammatory properties. It has long been used as a digestive aid. However, cayenne has more recently been shown to ease pain associated with arthritis and headaches. Chili peppers are widely considered to be a powerful anti-inflammatory spice, so be sure to include a dash of cayenne in your next dish.

Black Pepper

If cayenne is just too hot for your liking, you'll be happy to know that the milder black pepper has been identified for its anti-inflammatory properties as well. Known as the "King of Spices," black pepper has been valued for its flavor and anti-bacterial, antioxidant, and anti-inflammatory benefits. Studies have shown that the chemical compounds of black pepper, particularly piperine, may be effective in the early acute inflammatory process.

Clove

Cloves have been used as an expectorant, and to treat upset stomach, nausea, and inflammation of the mouth and throat. Research is still mixed, but evidence shows that clove may have anti-inflammatory properties. Powdered clove works well in baked goods and in some savory dishes, like hearty soups and stews. You can also use whole cloves to infuse both flavor and nutrition into hot drinks like tea

or cider

In Health, Rochelle Mazurek I hope you enjoy trying new recipes or adding new flavors to your current recipes. My go-to morning anti-inflammatory is sprinkling in turmeric, ginger and cinnamon in my coffee grounds just before turning on the coffee maker!
